This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Key achievements 2023-2024

To ensure all staff assess PE knowledge accurately.	The local authority school improvement advisor completed a deep dive with the PE lead: 'The PE passport assessment scheme is used and children achieve a bronze, silver or gold passport for each topic. Videos of children are logged on Seesaw as evidence for teacher judgments and assessments. The curriculum has been designed to include lots of repetition and opportunity for children to practice their skills and apply their knowledge'. Staff use declarative and procedural knowledge using the West Park Primary School progression map to ensure accurate assessments of pupils. Half termly data drop with photo or video evidence to support. Clear LO and success criteria in all PE lessons – staff training delivered following pupil voice.	Continue to moderate and support staff to accurately assess pupil's PE knowledge.

The local authority school improvement advisor completed a deep dive with the PE lead: 'SEND pupils are included in all PE lessons and some of the sports leaders are SEND pupils'.

Teaching Assistants support PE lessons to enable the lowest 20% needs to be met.

SENCO off school this year so this will remain a focus next academic year.



To ensure all pupils have access to a super curriculum which enables physical activity for all.

- An increase in pupils engaging in after school sport. In 2022-2023, 20% of pupils took part in an after school club. In 2023 – 2024 58% of pupils took part in an after school club (132 pupils)
- Increased engagement of pupils in regular physical activity:
- School purchased spare kit so children never miss PF lessons.
- School reward children with physical enrichment days for good behaviours in school. (Glow in the Dark Dodgeball, Glow in the dark scavenger hunts).
- School offered an increase of afterschool clubs such as: dance, cheerleading, archery, all girl boxing, multi skills, running clubs for KS1 and KS2.
- School held parent PE workshops to support Physical activity at home.
- 100% of pupils engage in physical activity through the super curriculum. (Personal challenges, residentials, enrichment days and sports week).
- Parents, children, extended families and staff engage in the daily mile each morning before school during Sports week.
- Wow activities during sports week: Drumba,
 Climbing wall, Dancing, Boogie Bounce, Challenge
 Academy, Panna Pitch.
- Year 2,4 and 6 attended residentials.
- School reward children with physical enrichment days for good behaviours in school. (Glow in the Dark Dodgeball, Glow in the dark scavenger hunts)
- Parent PE workshops to support Physical activity at home.
- Chance to Shine Cricket delivered 6 week program for year 1 – year 6 classes.
- Play leaders were trained at Aldersley stadium and run sports activities during lunchtimes.

Look into all girls boxing sessions for next year.
Expensive resource but confidence and
engagement of girls was considerably higher
than all other activities.

Positive effects on behaviour and attendance during Sports Week. Many parents noted how positive the daily mile was. Look at running this half termly and playground markings for the daily mile in the cold/wet seasons.

Look for new and exciting enrichment days for next academic year as a reward for good behaviour.

Play leaders to run next academic year. Positive impact on behaviour on the playground.
